#### Presentation

The development of International Law is a gradual process of humanization with the aim of reaching the basic principle of the international society. That is, the principle of dignity of the human being. The development of International Law is a gradual process aimed at fulfilling the basic principle of the International Society theory, that is, the commitment of nations to act for respecting and promoting human dignity.

Within this framework, this course will analyze the normative evolution of International Law.. Moreover, by analysing different case studies of national and international conflicts in which human dignity has been compromised, its implementation and effectiveness will be reflected upon and evaluated.

Throughout the course we will examine the content and evolution of the international conventions regulating the protection of civil populations in times of peace and in armed conflicts, both domestic and international.

- To increase knowledge in the field of Human Rights and International Humanitarian Law.
- To promote debate and discussion on the international system of Human Rights.
- To provide the participants with basic tools for the application, defence and promotion of Human Rights.
